Dear University Park neighbors,

After attending numerous open houses regarding the Latest Update of the Seattle Comp plan, three things became clear to me:

- Given recent history, these revisions will never end. Every year there is a new effort. Thanks to an aggressive takeover by the State Government giving it statewide control of zoning and code regulations plus oversight, Seattle is now forced to abide by its topdown, centralized, and uniform legislation (or did Seattle fold willingly), through intricate, convoluted and unending regulations! It's a power grab!
- We cannot rely on obtaining the truth from Planning Department employees who fail to refer to actual regulations; rather, they express their own interpretations/ speculations in real time and inconsistently from one another. I have observed this several times. For instance, there seems to be no hard fast rule regarding <u>Transition</u> <u>Zones</u>. This vagueness (or loophole) allows the City to make conflicting determinations regarding various proposed developments—those that further their own priorities.
- In spite of the new OneSeattlePlan grid of complexities that are to direct future growth in U Park, we still have more control than we knew: We just need to realize that the City cannot force us to abide by these latest maximum density, height, and bulk models. Even a Planning Department employee inferred this when I spoke with him.

Now is the perfect time for a retrospective assessment of our past and a recommitment to the future integrity of our neighborhood. But, we are only able to accomplish our goals when we ae committed to working together. Therefore each of us must answer this question: Should we reorient our future priorities to simpler causes, such as safety, a community spirit, and social gatherings? OR, should we remain proactive as we guard our neighborhood against outside intrusions from the City, the UW and developers seeking to change the identity and character of University Park? Are you willing to actively participate in these efforts—perhaps even as an elected board?

One person (me) cannot carry on alone anymore. So please reflect on the future of UPCC at this pivotal point, as we butt up against not just the City Government, but also the University of Washington and aggressive speculators.

The lights and decorations of Candy Cane Lane are here already!!! Candy Cane Lane is a circle of houses all decked out for the holidays, located on Park Road NE off of NE Ravenna Blvd.

The first night of lights is Saturday, December 6, and the last night is Thursday, January 1, 2026. The hours for viewing the lights are from 4:00 PM to 9:30 PM, with extended hours until 11:00 PM on Fridays and Saturdays.

You are encouraged to bring food donations (canned food or dry food like spaghetti boxes) for the Food Bank barrel at the end of the lane.

These beautiful houses on Park Road NE, were developed in the 1920s under a master architectural plan, which gives the area a sense of purpose and historical perspective that continues to this day. The site was owned by the Beck family who developed the Ravenna neighborhood.
